A social scientific research book covering qualitative methods (and also quantitative and mixed methods, if you are interested). These books tend to be very expensive, but some are available used. Some appropriate books include:

Michael Strausberg and Steven Engler, eds. *The Routledge Handbook of Research Methods in the Study of Religion*. Routledge, 2011.

Focused on religion and especially helpful.

Leavy, Patricia. Research Design: Quantitative, Qualitative, Mixed Methods, Arts-Based, and Community-Based Participatory Research Approaches. Guilford, 2017.

Has a section on aesthetics and arts, which may be especially helpful for some of you.

Neuman, Lawrence. Social Science Research Methods: Qualitative and Quantitative Approaches. Pearson, various editions.

A basic guide to both qualitative and quantitative research methods.

Creswell, John and Creswell. Research Design: Qualitative, Quantitative, and Mixed Methods Approaches. Sage, various editions.

Another basic guide, including mixed methods.

Creswell, John, and Cheryl Poth, *Qualitative Inquiry and Research Design: Choosing Among Five Approaches*. Sage, 2017.

Only addresses qualitative research, but offers a good variety of models.

Wertz, Frederick, et al. Five Ways of Doing Qualitative Analysis: Phenomenological Psychology, Grounded Theory, Discourse Analysis, Narrative Research, and Intuitive Inquiry. Guilford, 2011.

A detailed discussion of diverse qualitative research methods, including some that are especially relevant to religion, e.g. narrative and discourse analysis.

Patton, Michael. Qualitative Research and Evaluation Methods: Integrating Theory and Practice. Sage, 2014.

The most detailed, and includes some theoretical perspectives that are not addressed in the other books, e.g. grounded theory, which may be especially useful in religion.

Glazer, Barney, and Anselm Strauss. *The Discovery of Grounded Theory: Strategies for Research*. Aldine, 1967.

The classic introduction to grounded theory, in which theory is generated from data.

Holton, Judith and Isabelle Walsh, *Classic Grounded Theory: Applications With Qualitative and Quantitative Data*. Sage, 2016.

Focuses only on grounded theory, but is broad enough that it will be generally useful.

Charmaz, Kathy. *Constructing Grounded Theory*. Sage, 2014. Similar to the previous book.
