Co-hosted with the Society of Biblical Literature, the Annual Meetings are the largest events of the year in the fields of religious studies and theology. Some 10,000 people attended the 2016 Annual Meetings, enjoying access to more than 1100 academic sessions and additional meetings. This year's meetings will be held in Boston, Massachusetts from November 18-21.
