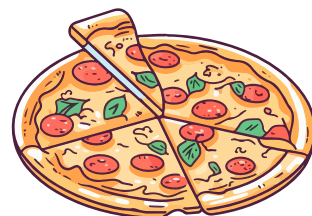

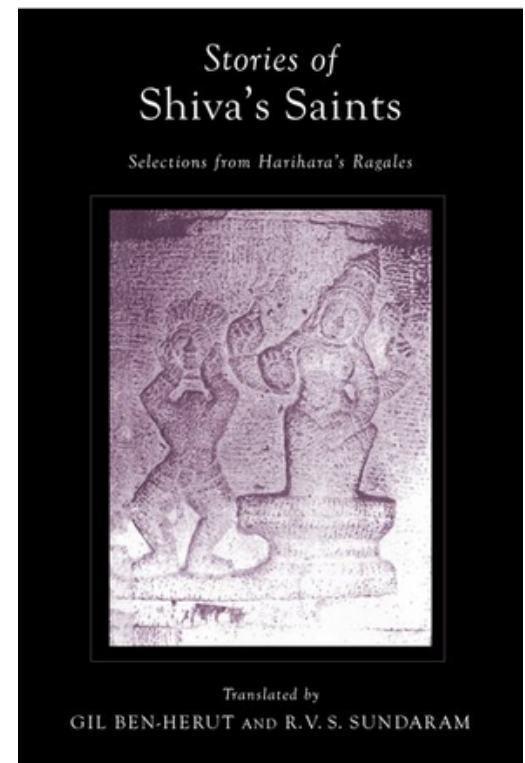
EVENTS

NEWS

- **Dr. Brahim Afrit** has recently been offered a **Visiting Scholar** position at Tulane University in the **Middle East and North Africa Studies Program**. He earned his Ph.D. in Religion from the University of Florida in 2024, specializing in Global Islam, and has focused on the role of religion in modern society. After completing his doctorate, he returned to Algeria, where he worked as a social entrepreneur in education. Academically, he has contributed chapters to three edited volumes and published two journal articles based on his dissertation.
- On **October 14th**, the University of Florida's **Center for the Study of Hindu Traditions (CHiTra)** hosted a virtual launch of *Stories of Shiva's Saints: Selections from Harihara's Ragales* (Oxford University Press, 2025) by **Gil Ben-Herut**, a professor at the University of South Florida, and **R.V.S. Sundaram**. Following Ben-Herut's presentation, the book was discussed by **Laurie Patton**, President of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences; **Paula Richman**, William H. Danforth Professor Emerita of South Asian Religions at Oberlin College; and **Harshita Mruthinti Kamath**, Visweswara Rao and Sita Koppaka Associate Professor in Telugu Culture, Literature, and History at Emory University.

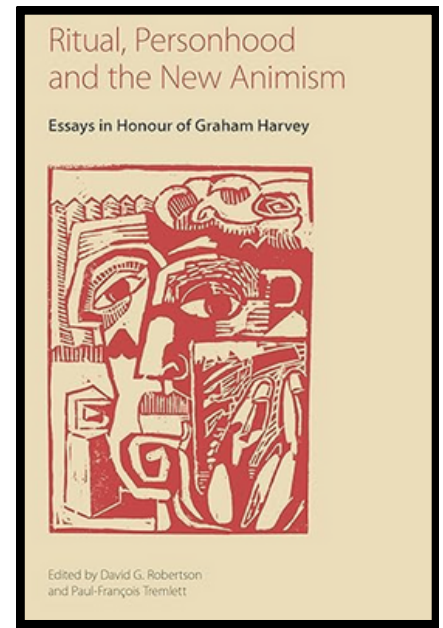


PUBLICATIONS

- **Dr. Bron Taylor** has published his essay “[Gaian Animism: Ritual Innovation and Nature Spirituality in Radical Environmentalism and the Global Environmental Milieu](#)” in *Ritual, Personhood and the New Animism: Essays in Honour of Graham Harvey*, edited by Paul-François Tremlett and David Robertson (Equinox, 2025, pp. 147–168).

In this contribution, Taylor explores how radical environmentalism, especially in the U.S. but with global reach, has developed a spiritually infused worldview he terms “Gaian animism.” This perspective blends animism (attributing agency or personhood to non-human nature) with Gaian spirituality (seeing Earth as a living, interconnected organism).

Taylor shows how this worldview takes shape through ritual innovations, from direct-action ceremonies to earth-based rites, and reflects a broader shift toward more-than-human relationality within global environmental spirituality. He argues that these practices challenge anthropocentrism, propose new forms of personhood for non-human nature, and illuminate how “Gaian animism” operates as both ecological critique and spiritual affiliation with the living Earth.

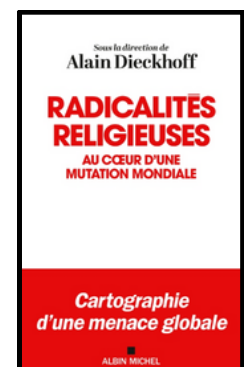
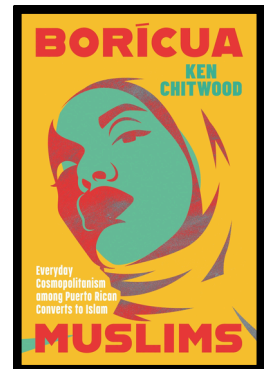


PUBLICATIONS

- Alumnus **Ken Chitwood**'s book "*Boricua Muslims: Everyday Cosmopolitanism Among Puerto Rican Converts to Islam*" has officially been published by the University of Texas Press. The book examines the experiences of Puerto Rican converts to Islam, both on the island and throughout the diaspora, as they grapple with questions of identity, faith, and belonging. It reveals how Islam has taken root within Puerto Rican communities and how Puerto Rican Muslims, in turn, redefine what it means to be Boricua, Muslim, and American.
- **Dr. Brahim Afrit** recently contributed his first edited volume on religious radicality in *Religious Extremism in Politics*, ed. Alain Dieckhoff. Paris: Albin Michel, 2025. The contribution is titled "*Salafism and Evangelicalism in West Africa*" and examines how globalization and secular postcolonial nation-state models have facilitated their regional prominence. He will present his research at SciencesPo/CERI in Paris on **November 6th** before a panel of religion scholars.
- **Dr. Terje Ostebo** gave a presentation for the [British Foreign, Commonwealth & Development Office](#) on **Friday, October 16th**, on the topic "*The Religion of Ethiopia's Prime Minister Abiy Ahmed: Pentecostalism, Prosperity Gospel, and the Power of Positive Thinking.*"

Ethiopian Prime Minister Abiy Ahmed's approach to religion marks a clear shift from the policies of his predecessors under the Ethiopian People's Revolutionary Democratic Front (EPRDF), which intentionally kept politics separate from religious discourse. This presentation explored Abiy's involvement in religious affairs, his ideological framework, and the evolving religious dynamics of the Abiy era, highlighting both significant changes and important continuities from the EPRDF period.

Rather than overstating Abiy's Pentecostal background or links to the prosperity gospel, the presentation examined how these beliefs intersect with the broader principles of Positive Thinking ideology.

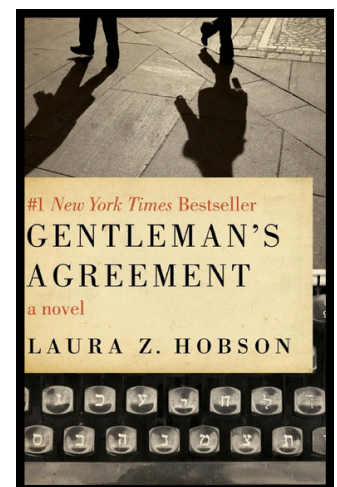

- On [November 12th](#), **Dr. Rachel Gordan** will be giving a presentation at [Barnard College](#) on “Moving from Race to Religion in Laura Z. Hobson’s *Gentleman’s Agreement* (1947)”. The bestselling novel and Academy Award winning film follows a Gentile journalist, Philip Green, who pretends to be Jewish to write a series of articles exposing the pervasive anti-Semitism in post-World War II America. By adopting a Jewish identity, he and his son experience prejudice firsthand, revealing the subtle social and economic forms of discrimination that respectable society often overlooks. His experiences and the resulting conflict with his fiancée, who is forced to confront her own prejudiced attitudes

Laura Z. Hobson’s bestselling novel confronted the issue of nonviolent antisemitism in American society. Beyond challenging prejudice, Hobson aimed to break down racist stereotypes by situating Jews firmly within the broader American religious landscape.



PRESENTATIONS

- On **October 20th**, **Dr. Vasudha Narayanan** gave a talk to the Visitor Experience, Retail Staff, and Guides at the [Minneapolis Institute of Art \(MIA\)](#) in conjunction with the museum's upcoming major exhibition on Cambodian art, opening October 24. The exhibition features approximately 250 Khmer bronze objects from the Hindu and Buddhist traditions. Its centerpiece is a 14-foot bronze reclining Vishnu, assembled by the Musée Guimet in Paris, where the exhibition was first inaugurated. Dr. Narayanan, who has been researching reclining Vishnu imagery in India and Cambodia, will return to Minnesota in November to speak to donors, visitors, and members of the Cambodian community about the connections between these images and classical Indian dance.
