Maharjan—now pursuing a Ph.D. in Interdisciplinary
Ecology—has been awarded a Research Abroad for
Doctoral Students (RADs) grant from UF's International
Center to support her research in Nepal. She received the
full requested amount of \$5,000. Her proposal, titled
"Integration of Traditional and Scientific Ecological
Knowledge for Urban Water Management: A Case Study
of Kathmandu, Nepal," focuses on how Traditional Knowledge Systems and
Western scientific approaches can be brought together to address Nepal's
intensifying environmental challenges. A key aspect of her work examines
the role of religion within these knowledge systems. Maharjan's dissertation

advisor is Dr. Bron Taylor, a member of the Religion faculty and an affiliate



of the Interdisciplinary Ecology program.






Dr. Gordan's book *Postwar Stories: How Books Made Judaism American* (Oxford University Press, 2024) was a finalist in the Modern Jewish History & Culture: Africa, Americas, Asia, & Oceania category. *Postwar Stories* delves into how Jewish literature has shaped American-Jewish identity, both post-World War II and the Holocaust.

Dr. Feller's book, *The Jewish Imperial Imagination: Leo Baeck and German-Jewish Thought* (Cambridge University Press, 2024), was a finalist in the Philosophy and Jewish Thought category. *The Jewish Imperial Imagination* explores Leo Baeck's religious thought that was written during the time of the Holocaust, and looks at it through a political lens to help understand Jewish Missionizing and the German-Jewish thoughts on colonization.

PRESENTATIONS

The Minneapolis Institute of Art (Mia) invited Professor **Dr. Vasudha Narayanan** back to give a talk to donors, visitors, and members of the Cambodian community after speaking to museum employees in October. These talks are in conjunction with a large exhibit on Cambodian bronzes and moderate a discussion linking the sculptures and a classical Indian dance performance called "Moving Bronzes." The centerpiece of this exhibit is a large, 11th century bronze Vishnu discovered in a well in West Mebon (near Angkor) in 1936. Dr. Narayanan has been studying reclining Vishnus in India and Cambodia for many years and visited this exhibit earlier this year at the Musée Guimet in Paris.

The large bronze Vishnu, on loan from the National Museum in Phnom Penh and restored in France before being displayed at the Musée Guimet in May 2025, will travel next year from Minneapolis to the Smithsonian, and then to the Asian Art Museum in San Francisco, before returning to its home in Phnom Penh.






• Dr. Bron Taylor is one of seven international scholars invited to participate in a conference on "Our Planetary Health: Religiosities, Ecologies, and Environmentalisms," to be held at Renmin University in Beijing, China, from June 18–20, 2026. The event is co-organized by anthropologist Professor Mayfair Yang 楊美惠 (University of California, Santa Barbara) and Professor Dedong Wei 魏德東 (Department of Philosophy, Renmin University) and will bring together leading Chinese and international scholars for interdisciplinary dialogue.

• Chair **Dr. Mario Poceski** was invited by the UF Center of Undergraduate Research (CURBS) to host a <u>Religions Research Workshop</u>. During the event, Dr. Poceski discussed his research on Chinese Buddhism and how he uses interdisciplinary methods such as textual, doctrinal, and institutional perspectives to uncover how Buddhist traditions evolved through literature, practice, and cultural exchange. The event was aimed at students interested in religion, history, philosophy, or Asian studies, seeking to explore connections between ancient texts and contemporary understandings of faith, culture, and practice.
