


In August 2025, graduate student

• Terje Ostebo has accepted the position as the Editor of the Northeast African Studies (NEAS) journal. Published by Michigan State University Press, it is one of the leading journals in the area of African Studies. The NEAS is a biannual, peer-reviewed, interdisciplinary journal that publishes original, high-quality research in the social sciences and humanities focused on the Horn of Africa and its neighboring regions—including Ethiopia, Eritrea, Sudan, South Sudan, Djibouti, and Somalia/Somaliland. Submissions are welcome from a wide range of disciplines, including history, anthropology, political science, sociology, religious studies, environmental studies, literature, and the arts. NEAS seeks contributions that challenge established debates and paradigms,

offer comparative insights relevant beyond the region, or draw on new sources and methodologies. Those who work on the journal are especially interested in work that takes transnational, transregional, or comparative approaches, as well as research that frames Northeast Africa in ways that go beyond national boundaries. Studies exploring the region's connections to the Red Sea and Indian Ocean worlds, the Arabian Peninsula, or Trans-Saharan networks—and those engaging with global history—are particularly encouraged. NEAS also publishes scholarly book reviews and, periodically, invites guest editors or solicits proposals for special themed issues.



• **Terje Ostebo** has been awarded a Visiting Professor Fellowship at the **University of Messina**, Italy, for May 2026. During his residency, Dr. Ostebo will deliver a series of guest lectures and devote the majority of his time to research and work on his forthcoming book.


PUBLICATIONS

Professor Bron Taylor's article, "An Inquiry into Surfing and the Sublime," has been accepted for publication in The Routledge Handbook of Religion and Sport, eds. Afe Adogame, Rebecca T. Alpert, James Deming. It is slated for publication in early 2026. The practice of surfing oceanic waves is entangled with intense emotions and religious perceptions. Sometimes surfers fuse such perceptions to one of the world's longstanding religions but for many, surfing is independent of them, a kind of 'aquatic nature religion.' The article explores such surfing spirituality arguing that for many, surfing is a source of revelation that evokes feelings of belonging and connection to nature while providing a wellspring of meaning and pro-environmental purpose.



PRESENTATIONS

 Rachel Gordan hosted a discussion about her first book, Postwar Stories, at the Ritzer Lecture at MetroWest JCC in West Orange, New Jersey on Wednesday, September 10. She talked about postwar Jewish literature and its connections to her next project, a biography of American-Jewish novelist, Laura Z. Hobson. Postwar Stories examines 1940's and 1950's antiantisemitism and "Introduction to Judaism" literature. It explores the role of middlebrow literature in shaping post-Holocaust American Jewish identity, and addresses the changing categorization of Jews from a marginalized group to members of a respected American religion.


